(For Inclusive Volunteering for individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder)

To guide volunteer involving organisations and services in implementing exceptional inclusive practices online and provide greater opportunity for people living with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) for volunteer engagement and participation.

Online Physical Access

1. Structure	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Information kept simple without unnecessary detail.			
Consistent layout of information so it can be followed.			
Information, navigation and content should all be predictable and provide feedback.			
Between each section, blank spaces should be used to separate content and support attention.			

2. Text & Headings	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Text is easily readable by using fonts such as sans-serif and keeping the words at size 12 minimum.			
Important information in bold to emphasise its importance.			
Large blocks of text and long paragraphs should be avoided.			
Text should be broken up into smaller sections and be separated clearly by headings.			

3. Interaction	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Websites can be resized for accessibility, meaning they can be accessed on any device, as using sites on a mobile phone/iPad provides a different level of interaction through a touchscreen.

4. Navigation	Yes	No	Comments
Navigation of information can be easily followed by using a straightforward structure, where links are easily found and labelled.			
Limit the use of too many links to avoid confusion.			
Sites are responsive and provide quick access to links and content.			
Navigations back to the home page, exiting the current link, and help buttons are available and visible on every page.

5. Things to avoid	Yes	No	Comments
Avoid visual or information overload.			
Avoid background sounds, moving images or text, horizontal scrolling and flashing images.

6. Colour	Yes	No	Comments
Predominate colours such as red and yellow avoided.			
Effective colour contrast is utilised to ensure access to content.			

Intellectual Access

1. Use plain English	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Language is simple to suit the audience.			
Technical terms defined.			
Keep language literal -avoid jargon, acronyms, abbreviations.			

2. Be brief, clear and concise	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Use simple minimal sentences.			
Text is clear, concise and states the purpose.			
Information is ordered from most important to least.			
Be direct by using present tense and active voice in the text.			
Clear headings and titles and provide a clear structure to text content.			

3. Use descriptive button links	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Use descriptive text for link buttons that give clear instruction and provide consistent cues.			

4. Error Prevention	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Set up to prevent accidental errors, by asking secondary questions such as “Are you sure?”, “yes” or “no”. When not possible, there are other ways to recover from errors by always having an undo option or similar.			
Avoid using images that portray optical illusions, ambiguity or move away from logic.			

5. Provide opportunities for better understanding	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Accommodate for multiple understandings of information by using concrete images, icons and examples where appropriate, to communicate information.			
Avoid using images that portray optical illusions, ambiguity or move away from logic			

6. Breakdown tasks	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Tasks broken down into smaller steps and subtasks.			
Make interactive towards their interests and preferences to promote engagement and participation if possible.			

Social Access

1. Provide social assistance	Will this be helpful?

Assistance is available to website users and volunteers.			

2. Provide feedback	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Provide interactive feedback after tasks to provide encouragement and so the individual can understand their performance.			

3. Use FAQ formats	Will this be helpful?

Use FAQ formats to enhance clarity and relevance.			

4. Be mindful of language	Will this be helpful?		
	Yes	No	Comments
Use language that is sensitive to ASD culture and community preferences to describe ASD.			
Avoid using sarcasm, metaphors and figures of speech, as individuals with ASD may find it difficult to understand these.			

Useful Tools

	Will this be helpful?		
Video Modelling	Yes	No	Comments
Video modelling is an effective tool that promotes independence and task completion. It incorporates using self-modelling or an adult model to describe each step of a task and visualise instructions.			

	Will this be helpful?		
Task Analysis	Yes	No	Comments
Task Analysis consists of task purpose, task classification and task demands. Task Analysis assists the user in knowing how much time they are required to allocate to the task, what tools they will require, what knowledge they have in relation to the task, what knowledge is required and what strategies/strengths are appropriate in completing the task.

Task Reminders	Yes	No	Comments
Task reminder is a great tool to ensure tasks get completed on time, promoting independence and improving performance.			
Additional reminders such as planners, to do lists, and diaries might be helpful in assisting with task completion.

Images should accompany the text to deliver the same message with additional clarity as the individual is able to visualise. Additionally, charts, graphs and symbols help to further convey and visualise the message.
